January 8, 2007 - Here come the P.I.G. 's!


January is always a time for resolutions, a time to get your life in order, a time to get organized and make lists, and a time to plan new projects to get done for the year... If you are always included in the category of Quilters who are making plans for the NEXT project, have we got a Challenge for you!!

Plan to be a participant in TBQ's P.I.G. Challenge. P.I.G. = Projects In a Grocery bag.

Here are the rules:

- Bring THREE unfinished quilt projects to January's TBQ Guild meeting—each one should be in it's own grocery bag.
- During the meeting, all participants will be asked to tell the Membership about each of their three
 P.I.G.'s. (Explain what it is, when you started, why you started, why the project is still worth finishing,
 etc.)
- The Membership will vote on which of your three P.I.G.'s they want you to finish.
- After that decision is made, our Recorders will document your P.I.G.
- You will have ONE YEAR to finish the P.I.G. that the membership has selected.
- January 2008's Show & Tell will include a display of completed P.I.G.'s.
- If a P.I.G. Challenge participant fails to meet the Challenge to get their P.I.G. completed, that participant will be obligated to make a Charity Quilt in TBQ's name.

At December's meeting, Carolyn Edwards and Chris Anders demonstrated what is involved in this P.I.G. Challenge, and you all voted for the P.I.G. that Carolyn is to finish by January 2008. Start rummaging through your UFO's. Think about projects you want to get finished. A project box full of quilt parts is the typical P.I.G. A quilt top can be considered a P.I.G. Even a sack of collected fabrics and a pattern counts as a P.I.G.! Plan to join in on the fun!!

Programs Coming Soon

VIRGINIA ROBERTSON

February 12, 2007 Lecture: **If Monet Were A Quilter: A Trunk Show**. This trunk show is an entertaining view of the quilts and fabric designs of textile artist Virginia Robertson. Monet's painting are used as a metaphor to show how color changes a quilt design. There are several versions of each quilt that show how much color changes the feel of a project. Interspersed with the quilts are studio shots and stories about the designing of quilting fabrics.

THE QUILTER'S COLOR WHEEL, GRANDMOTHER'S FAN OR SPEEDY, DRESDEN PLATE

February 12, 2007 Workshop: Monday afternoon: 1PM \$20.00 per person:

This is an easy project where you can choose from three different patterns. There is no needle turn appliqué or curved piecing with Virginia's new techniques. Materials Fee. Cost of your pattern:

PICKLE DISH, NEW YORK BEAUTY OR WEDDING RING

February 13, 2007 Workshop Tuesday: \$30.00 per person: Set up from 8:30 A.M. Class starts promptly at 9:15 A.M. to 3:30 PM.

Take your pick, this is Virginia's most popular class. She has even taught it in Spain, in Spanish! Use Virginia's new acrylic cutting templates, see through foundation papers and choose your favorite design after the demo. Sew from the back or the front, it doesn't matter which way you learned to paper piece, you will be able to use Virginia's new foundation papers. There is no guess work. This is a different, easier method from all the other techniques.

Virginia will demonstrate the different quilts and talk about color. Then the rest of the day will be spent sewing the quilt of your choice. Select from the Perfect Pickle Dish, the Mini Pickle Dish, the Broken Pickle Dish, Wedding Ring, Mini Wedding Ring or a New York Beauty style quilt.Materials Fee: Cost of pattern:

March: Janet Carruth from Phoenix will do a power point lecture/trunk show on Penny Rugs. She will teach a half-day class on Monday afternoon after our meeting. The pattern will be a basket of apples. Janet will supply all the materials to complete this project for a kit fee of \$25-\$30.

April: Shelley Swanland will be doing a trunk show of approximately 40 quilts that represent work done over the last eight years. She has developed a technique for constructing Cathedral Window quilts using layered piecing techniques and featuring rolled bias curves. She states that although her patterns look intricate and complex, they are really fast and easy to construct. Her workshop on Tuesday (after our meeting) will be a combination of her patterns Berries Jubilee and Parchment & Black Lacquer Table Runner. She will also have her patterns for sale at the meeting and at the workshop.

Calling All Hand Quilters!

Please make a New Year's Resolution to give a day or two--sometime this year--of Hand Quilting to Sharlot Hall! Every Thursday morning from 10 a.m. to Noon, the Sharlot Hall Quilters meet in the Transportation Building, a.k.a. the Carriage House, on the grounds of Sharlot Hall Museum. Bring your thimble, needles, needle-threader, and scissors! It's a service to the Prescott community to contribute to "living history". Plus, it's fun to talk to the tourists--they always have their own "quilt stories" to share.
