President's Message – March TBQ News


Top O' the Mornin' to you, Quilt Lassies!!

Housekeeping:

These ladies know they have a big challenge ahead of them. They were chosen because they understand the qualities that officers of TBQ must possess to get the job done. Being in a Quilters Guild allows you, as members, to take advantage of the quilt speakers and workshops, to glean the inspiration and enthusiasm of other Quilters in their Show & Tell items, and to relish the friendship of Quilters! Being in a Quilters Guild also generates a responsibility to "work" for your Guild, to "give back" for all the benefits you have gained in Guild membership. The Mentors..... on Quilting on a Frame

Everyone is different, so the following is what works for us. Make changes as you find necessary, or what is comfortable for you. First of all, LOOSEN UP! Most people I have noticed have the quilt taut on the frame. After you have it set and all the fabrics seem aligned, back off 2 or more notches on your frame (assuming you have notches, or back off at least a quarter turn of the dowel). The quilt should be loose enough to hold your thread, glasses, scissors, and perhaps a cat or two with no chance of anything (or anyone) falling off. If your scissors tend to slip, back off some more. You should be able to manipulate the fabric enough to quilt comfortably. I can push my quilt up about 3-4" as I quilt (alone), so use this as a guide. For those of you with access to the website, there will be pictures, hopefully showing the slack in the quilt. If you are quilting with a group, the quilt should be even looser, as each person needs to be able to push the quilt up from beneath without interferring with the other quilters. This will make it much easier to do curves and odd directions, as most of us find it difficult to quilt anything but toward our bodies.

There is no problem with the alignment of the quilt with it being so loose. If you are using a 2 rail system, the quilt has already been basted. If you are lucky enough to have a 3 rail system, then the fabrics are aligned and ready to quilt. You should have a tension system for the sides (doesn't have to be pretty - muslin and safety pins work great), which will keep the fabrics from shifting even more.

Another factor to keep in mind is the height of the quilt frame from your waist. When sitting at the frame, your elbow should be slightly tilted UP when your arm is resting on the quilt....this will enable you to reach both over and under the quilt with minimal tension on your back. Again, this is a personal matter, but be mindful of your positioning as that will add to your distress over the hours. Don't be afraid to alter your frame height/tilt to get the perfect spot. When working with others on the frame, you will not have this option as the quilt will be level. Therefore, you might try bringing a seat pad or perhaps even a lower seat when working on a group quilt....do what works for YOU.

This also holds true for quilting on a hoop - loosen up and have fun with the process. When placing your quilt on the hoop (hand, lap or stand), push the top hoop over the bottom hoop and down 1/2 way. Now, place your open hand on the quilt and push gently until the top hoop is aligned with the bottom hoop. Again, your glasses, thread, scissors should sit there nicely when at an angle. There is also no need to tighten the screw on the hoop - it should be tight enough not to slip, but not so tight that it creases the fabics. Again, watch your height in relation to the quilt. Get a comfortable chair and work with a comfortable tilt.

Lighting is of utmost importance, especially for those elusive small stitches. It is best to have a light DIRECTLY over your working surface, with the light under your line of vision so you don't have to contend with the glare. Have the light coming over your shoulder (opposite from your stitching hand) as close to the center of the work as you can get it if at all possible. Remember, keep the light LOW over your quilting, not up high. You only need to light up the section you are working on. If you find yourself doing a group quilt in a poorly lit spot, try one of those lights that hang around your neck. The best lights I have found do not have to be expensive - goosenecks or those ugly lights used by architects that reach out about 2 feet work great. I prefer the new screw in fluorescent bulbs as they do not get hot (also not as bright and "glary").

Sure hope this helps anyone wanting to hand quilt. If you have questions, call us. Pictures will be on the web showing the frame and hoops - and some ideas for lighting. Please check it out. Margaret and Tina

Janet will supply all the materials to complete this project for a kit fee of \$30. Participants are asked to bring cloth scissors, pins, and a pencil

April: Shelley Swanland will be doing a trunk show of approximately 40 quilts that represent work done over the last eight years. She has developed a technique for constructing Cathedral Window quilts using layered piecing techniques and featuring rolled bias curves. She states that although her patterns look intricate and complex, they are really fast and easy to construct. Her workshop will be on Tuesday, April 10, at the Yavapai Hills Clubhouse; set-up will begin at 8:30 am. The workshop will be a combination of her patterns Berries Jubilee and Parchment & Black Lacquer Table Runner. She will also have her patterns for sale at the meeting and at the workshop.

May: The Quilt Show Committee will present the program and will bring us up to date on the show happenings.

June: Our member Susie Martin will present a program on hand dyeing fabrics. She will also have two classes, with eight members in each; the classes will be on Tuesday, June 12 & Saturday, June 16. She has a technique of dyeing fabrics that does not require a lot of big pots, or buckets, but rather Zip-Loc bags.

July: Thumb Butte's Annual Birthday Party.

<u>August:</u> Our own Susan Smith will present a program on color and fabric selection.

September: Mary Stori will do a lecture and a half day workshop on Monday, September 10, after our meeting, and a full day workshop on Tuesday, September 11.

A total of 80 walker bags have been completed. Many men, women and several guild members have benefited from this project. Thank you Sheila Smith for taking home the last 7 bags to complete, and to all other guild members for making these and donating fabric.

Earlene Hansen and I completed 12 pillows at the Quilt and Sew Connection in Prescott Valley on Monday, February 19. When the last 8 are completed the guild will have made and donated 50 pillows to the Family Advocacy office in Prescott Valley. Montez Deputy, our contact at that office, has told me heart warming stories about what these pillows have meant to children and women who have been able to choose one. Our guild members have made this possible.

In March I will have patterns and background fabric to complete the 16 block quilt to go with the book, No Dragons On MY Quilt. The quilt and book will then be donated to an elementary school in Prescott. What a great introduction to the importance of and appreciation of quilts to children. If you love to applique I do hope you will consider making one or more of these blocks.

For those who are interested in making an Ott light cover or a sewing machine cover to be sold at the quilt show along with the pot holders, I will have the patterns available at the March meeting. If enough members are interested, I can arrange another work day at the Quilt and Sew Connection in Prescott Valley, or we can get together at my home to sew.

Quilt Show Boutique

Start cranking those machines to get your creations ready to sell in the Boutique! We are again providing the "Ye Olde Shoppe" Boutique for those of you interested in marketing your wearables and/or quilts. Once again we will be disbursing 90% of the sale price back to you, while 10% will go to the guild. If you've ever investigated "splits" in consignment shops, you realize that this is an excellent percentage of return.

Since we found in the past that jewelry doesn't sell well, we've eliminated it from our stock this year. We do recommend that you price your items reasonably, to facilitate their sales. A suggestion was made that if you are going to make placemats, that you make eight rather than four. As a whole, table runners and placemats were not big sellers. We will not be accepting potholders or any other items that are in competition with the Ways and Means Committee sales.

We have provided the instructions (A) and entry forms (B and C), as well as the price tags (D), on our web site. We have included an example of how to fill out the price tags, and have also provided a new form, Supplemental Sales Form (C). This is a new form for multiple items to which it wouldn't be appropriate to attach individual price tags.

Pricing your items is always a challenge. I had several calls regarding this subject and I found it very difficult to decide what price was appropriate. My advice today is the same as it was then: Price your items as reasonably as you can afford to do.
