From the Mentors:

There was a discussion at the August meeting (in the refreshment area, of course!) about the differences between a Mola, made by the Kuna Indians of Central America and Pa Ndau, made by the Hmong of Viet Nam (etc.). While at first glance they do look similar, there are marked differences. The primary difference is the design. The Hmong use more geometric designs cut like a snowflake (think Hawaiian) or overall geometric patterns repeated. The Kuna use the influences of their surroundings and of course whatever anyone will pay for...Santa Claus, military patches, cola drinks, whatever is in "vogue". Molas are rarely symmetrical. Pa Ndau are always symmetrical.

They are constructed differently also. The Pa Ndau are cut like snowflakes then placed on the layer of fabrics giving perfect symmetry. The Mola is layered first then the design is sketched on the top layer of fabric, giving almost no chance at symmetry; however, the designs are very well balanced. A Mola is more free.

If anyone out there has an example of Hmong reverse appliqué, please contact me. I would love to have both examples at a meeting to show the differences/similarities. I am so glad this came up as I learned something researching this! Thanks Candace and Elizabeth! Margaret Mecca

<u>August 2007</u> - Kendra Maclean, a designer from Chandler, AZ, will present a program and trunk show on miniature and small quilts. She has just released a new book entitled "Quick & Easy Quilts for Small Spaces".

<u>Sept. 2007</u> - Mary Stori will do a lecture on Monday, Sept. 10th; and a half-day workshop on "Improving your Quilting Stitch", after our meeting. She will also be doing a full-day workshop on Tuesday, September 11, which will be "Beading Basics and Beyond". There will be a required bead kit available at the workshop for \$10.00. October 2007 - Pattie Krause, from The Quilters' Store in Sedona, will do a lecture and trunk show on collages at our meeting, and a half day workshop on Monday, October 8. She will do a full day workshop on Tuesday, October 9. You will need to participate in both workshops for this class. Monday's class will be choosing fabrics and cutting out patterns, and Tuesday's class will be the actual construction of the collage.

Patty's description of the lecture is as follows: "Free yourself of rulers and pointed triangles. Learn how to design a quilt around a motif, create scenes or simply play with color. Let your collages reflect your humor, fantasies or dreams. The rules are few; the experience is self-directed. As a side benefit, your free- motion quilting will improve overnight with this technique.

The creative concepts incorporate Patty's experiences working with paper collage as a career counselor, and with fabric collages as a quilter. The collage technique present is adapted from Rosemary Eichorn's book, The Art of Fabric Collage."


<u>November 2007</u> - Susan Smith will present a program on "Color and Fabric Selection"...

<u>December 2007</u> - The annual Holiday Party.


