February President's Message

There's no place like home! Even though I had a fabulous time in Japan, it's good to be back among people who speak English, and the comfort of my own home.

My son (Joe) started working in Japan in January 2016 and will be



there until about October of this year. His wife and 2 sons joined him there when school in Flagstaff ended. Their summer was spent in Okayama, where Joe's workplace is located. In August they moved to Kobe where the kids could go to an international school. They are learning Japanese, a very difficult language, and few people in Japan actually speak English. Their daughter from ASU and our son & wife from

Atlanta, joined us for the holidays. Christmas is not much of a celebration there, since few people are Christian, but the New Year and days following are days of big celebrations crowds, especially at the Shrines and Temples. We did a lot of travel by train to other towns. Hiroshima was a very emotional memorial to see with photos of the damage and injured people. Towards the end of our stay, Joe let us venture off on the train by ourselves after showing us how to ask questions on our cell phone with an app that translated the English to Japanese figures. We caught a train in a hurry coming back one day, and I was worried it might be the wrong connection, so I wrote a sentence that was translated to Japanese, showed it to the 2 women across from us, and one answered in English! For signs written in their symbols, the app had a way to take a photo and translate it in English. Nice technology to have in a foreign country.

We learned some culture while there too. No touching, shaking hands, etc., just bowing the head to say hello, goodbye, thank you, etc. Many people wear masks and the internet said it was to prevent their spread of disease for the wearer. I checked with Joe and he said it originated in China and was worn to prevent toxins in the air from entering your airways. Today he thinks it more of a preventative measure to protect the users from diseases. Much of their time is spent in close proximity to others on the trains, buses, and everyday crowds. very dense. Joe's apartment is on the 54th floor, where the elevator takes 55 seconds to get from open doors on floor 1 to 54. It was so smooth you could barely feel it moving and stopping. I was surprised to never see traffic lines. It's crowds of people and bikes instead. Cars are very expensive to buy and maintain, not to mention park. Licenses are pricey and hard to get, as Joe found.

The Japanese people are so nice, but you won't feel that when going to the train station. Everyone is in a hurry, never yielding to others, and you better watch out for the bikes. That said, I think that part of their life is understandable. In the US we tend to be aggressive in our cars. Most Japanese must depend on bus or rail for all transportation. Our grand children take a train and bus to school. They loved the freedom of staying late after school if they wanted, and it's so safe. My daughter-in-law loved not having to drive to school to pick them up. It is extremely rare to own a car.

What do I miss the most about Japan? The heated toilet seats, especially in the night!
