October will be the month that Rachel Clark drops by. Rachel comes from a long line of sewers and has been doing wearable art since 1973. She says her garments can be "whimsical, political or practical but they always

reflect her love of traditional quiltmaking." Rachel's lecture is a fashion show entitled, "Anatomy of a Garment". She'll need 6-8 models sizes 6-16 and so think about helping out—it should be fun. Her workshop is a technique class where you will learn fast piecing, appliqué, fake bound buttonholes and piping. Most class participants finished the front of their project and we hope to have some show and tell for next months meeting. Rami taught us some new twists on traditional sewing techniques. Who knew that smocking could create such beautiful fabric variations and prairie points could be done in one strip. We thank Rami; she was great. Rami read a story at the end of her lecture. Here is her story:

Rami Kim's Story

When I was a little boy, my mother used to embroider a great deal. I would sit at her knee and look up from the floor and ask what she was doing. She informed me that she was embroidering. I told her that it looked like a mess from where I was. As from the underside I watched her work within the boundaries of the little round hoop that she held in her hand, I complained to her that it sure looked messy from where I sat.

She would smile at me, look down and gently say, "My son, you go about your playing for a while, and when I am finished with my embroidering, I will put you on my knee and let you see it from my side."

I would wonder why she was using some dark threads along with the bright ones and why they seemed so jumbled from my view. A few minutes would pass and then I would hear Mother's voice say, "Son, come and sit on my knee."

This I did only to be surprised and thrilled to see a beautiful flower or a sunset. I could not believe it, because from underneath it looked so messy. Then Mother would say to me, "My son, from underneath it did look messy and jumbled, but you did not realize that there was a predrawn plan on the top. It was a design. I was only following it. Now look at it from my side and you will see what I was doing."

Many times through the years I have looked up to my Heavenly Father and said, "Father, what are You doing?" He has answered, "I am embroidering your life." I'd say, "But it looks like a mess to me. It seems so jumbled. The threads seem so dark. Why can't they all be bright?" The Father seems to tell me, "My child, you go about your business of doing My business, and one day I will bring you to Heaven and put you on my knee and you will see the plan from My side.

There are FALL quilts, quilts of FALL colors, and LOTS of Log Cabin Quilts! Quilts made with the Log Cabin pattern have been popular for 200 years! In the early days, Log Cabin quilts were made from wool and silk pieces. Traditional blocks were made up of 'logs' pieced around a red square, representing the hearth. Other blocks were "Courthouse Steps" and "Pineapple". The varied block settings became known as "Barn Raising", "Straight Furrow", "Sunshine and Shadow". This display of Log Cabin Quilts and FALL Colors Quilts emphasize Prescott's fabulous FALL season. Isn't it great to be right here, right now?! So...for your next trip through Prescott, stop in to see TBQ's latest quilt display! It's not out of the way--it's on your way home from TBQ's meeting on October 11th!

Marketplace

The Creative Threads mini-group is busy producing a range of items for the Marketplace (the TBQ boutique). We are counting on member participation as well. What can you do? Make an item and bring it to TBQ to place in the donation bucket, donate materials (list below), make a muslin backed strip block (instructions below), or volunteer to take one of the unfinished items we bring to the monthly meetings. Thanks for your help!

Materials to donate: Embellishments (for small embellishment bags with lace, beads, yarn, buttons that will be sold at the show), polyfill (to stuff DD dolls and anything else we come up with) and Bali pop remnants.

<u>Muslin backed block instructions</u>: Supplies: 10 inch square piece of muslin with 45 degree diagonal line drawn off center, strips of theme fabric in ranges of 1 ½ inch width up to 2 ¾ inch width (large strips work best covering the points). Theme: Fall (don't use very light background as it will stand out) or black and whites/white and blacks (intermix)

Directions: 1) Lay first strip down face up with one side on the drawn line. (Make sure fabric strip covering the corners is wide enough to prevent a seam on the corners). Lay another strip down on top of first strip with wrong side up (right sides of strips face each other; strips are lined up along the drawn line). Sew ¼ inch seam. Flip the top strip open and press.

2) Continue adding strips to both sides of the first strip as described in step 1 until the 10 inch muslin square is covered.

3) Bring blocks back to TBQ. Creative Threads mini-group will do final trimming.

We are still taking red and white blocks made from the Paths and Stiles pattern from Quilters Cache website. Here is the link:

http://www.quilterscache.com/P/PathsandStilesBlock.html It's a 9 1/2 inch block that can be made from scrap whites and reds. Look for the Ugly bucket and add your donations. Thanks for your contributions!

If obtaining items from our storage unit, please be sure to fill in the sheet on the clipboard noting what you are borrowing and the date you take and bring it back.
