- A "quilting deadline" (e.g., must be quilted by XX date) will not be accepted.
- Quilt sandwich must be basted.

If you don't have a quilt ready to be hand quilted, think about buying a ticket for someone else who is ready!

And if you want to learn how to hand quilt, come on down to the Transportation Building on the Sharlot Hall Museum grounds (Thursday mornings, 10 a.m. to Noon). The TBQ Sharlot Hall Quilters are ready, willing and able to get you started! If you want a lesson or two, call me, and we'll be sure to have a "practice quilt sandwich" on hand to get you going! Join the others who are getting back to the basics of hand quilting!



Remember to get your blue ticket for each day you attend a workshop or meeting. You get a blue ticket when you bring a goodie or show your quilts or bring a birthday gift. You get a blue ticket if you display your quilts at the Community Center. If you do something, ANYTHING, you get a blue ticket. Put your name on the back and deposit it in the NO BAKE BAKE SALE box. TBQ DVD Lending Library Procedure

1. TBQ DVD lending library will be open to members before monthly meetings and during break with the exception of July and December luncheons.

2. Members will be able to check out DVDs for the period of one month (two months when checking out in the months of June and November).

3. A late fee of \$1.00 per month per DVD will be charged.

4. A spreadsheet will be maintained listing DVDs by author (or company) and by title so that members can search for specific DVDs. A wait list will be maintained.

5. Checkout will be accomplished using a spreadsheet where the member will write their name and phone number. By writing their name TBQ members agree to respect copyright laws.

6. Members are encouraged to donate DVDs or donate money towards purchase of DVDs and their names will be noted on the DVD label (e.g. donated by xy)

7. DVDs will be transported to and from meetings be DVD Library committee members.

Sharlot blall Quilters




TBQ's Sharlot Hall Quilters loaded a new quilt into the hand quilting frame at Sharlot Hall on September 30th, and the quilting has begun!
