quilting designs that will perfectly suit your quilt!

February 2011 - Mary Lou Weidman.

Day 1 - 3 hr class: This workshop introduces new friends to the technique called "Hoochy Mama" which uses 4" strips of fabric to make wonderful traditional blocks wonky and fun. These blocks can make any everyday block into something interesting, exciting and fun and even better, once you get the hang of this technique and style, you can make a quilt in much less time. For baby quilts, hangings and gifts this is the perfect class. Come prepared to learn about color, value and a new way to make fabulous, funky blocks. Smiling and laughter is a part of this experience too.



Day 2 - 6 hr class: This class is for those students who know how to do the Hoochy Mama blocks or who have taken classes before and want to stretch even farther. We will be exploring "things" made of Hoochy Mama blocks, wild wild geese, flowers, cats and hats and more. This is for students to who want to get out of the box even farther...maybe even jumping high out of that box. If you want to stretch your creativity, this class is for YOU.

I have again accepted the Chair position of Quilt Show Vignettes. And it's time again to start thinking about Quilt Show Vignettes!! Read through the following list and let me know if you and/or your best quilting pal and/or your mini group can help out! Vignettes are a part of our TBQ Quilt Show where we feature a small, room-size area set up within the Quilt Show space, with a designated theme to enhance the Quilt Show theme. OK...now you're saying to yourself, what is our Quilt Show theme? "PRESCOTT IS..." is our quilt show theme!! Woo hoo! Each Vignette needs a Leader--an organizer, someone who can say, "I will make sure that happens!" It's a chance to call up your creative juices and your friends or your mini-group, and say, "We can do that!"

Here are the suggested Vignette themes for our "Prescott Is..." Quilt Show:

*Prescott Is...*the Christmas City (Leader: "Roni" Barron) This obviously can include Christmas quilts and all the regalia that goes with Christmas!

This is the spot for outdoorsy quilts, camp quilts, lodge quilts, etc.
